Anastasia Crickley
Ireland

Anastasia is a community worker who until 2015 was head of the Dept Applied Social Studies at Maynooth University. She led the development of community work education from outreach through professional programmes to doctoral studies and of university and national initiatives to enable inclusion of minorities and marginalised groups throughout higher education. Anastasia has worked nationally and globally for human rights including as Chair of the UN Committee on the Elimination of Racism and the EU Fundamental Rights Agency. She was a member of the Council of Europe Framework Convention Advisory Committee and Personal Representative on Racism of the OSCE Chair-in-Office and is currently Chair of the Minority Rights Group International and of Pavee Point Traveller and Roma Centre. She chairs the All Ireland Endorsement Body for Community Work Education and Training and is actively involved in Community Work Ireland the national association for community workers in Ireland.



Ihor Okhrimenko
Ukraine

Rector of the Kiev Cooperative Institute of Business and Law, Doctor of Economics, Professor, Expert of the International Program "Inclusive Community Development". Ihor started working as a carpenter. In 1993, he entered the Ukrainian State Agrarian University. He moved to the National University of Bioresources and Environmental Management as a professor, head of department and later the Dean of the Faculty of Agrarian Management. From 2020 he was the Rector for Educational and Scientific Work of the Kiev Cooperative Institute of Business and Law and was the Chairman of the Scientific and Methodological Commission of the Ministry of Agrarian Policy.



Bhargavi Davar
India

Ph. D., Director, Transforming Communities for Inclusion, TCI, a global organization of persons with psychosocial disabilities and intersectional identities, working with a vision for their full inclusion. Bhargavi is an "adult survivor of childhood exposure to mental asylums" in post colonial India; and has survived enduring trauma of 2 decades or more, recovering through the use of life affirming nutritional, body based and trauma informed self healing approaches. She has worked extensively in the field of critical mental health research, intersectionality, community development practices and advocacy since 1993. She founded the Bapu Trust for Research Mind & Discourse, the first Indian user survivor organization to give an organisational framework to her advocacy work and served as its Director for 20 years. Her interests span social sciences, feminist and cultural studies, disability inclusive community development and wellbeing, going beyond 'mental health'.

CLIMATE EMERGENCY AS OPPORTUNITY TO PROMOTE DISABILITY INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Climate related disasters continue on the rise, with floods, drought, and hurricanes (among others), leading to unprecedented humanitarian crises. Persons with disabilities and their communities are among those most exposed and impacted by these climate related disasters, because they are often poorer, live in more exposed and volatile areas, because they struggle to receive timely and accessible warnings, or because they simply cannot access evacuation routes or are left behind. Guesstimates suggest that persons with disabilities constitute 20% of those most vulnerable to climate change. They are also 2 to 4 times more likely to be injured or to perish in a disaster event. This situation is fuelled by the fact that they are too often bypassed in climate change and disaster related decision-making processes and climate change action, and their voices are severely under-represented, including at a community level.

Over the past years, disability inclusive development (DID) has emerged as a major narrative and practice pushing for a development that is not only sensitive and responsive to the needs of persons with disabilities, but that mainstreams disability across all levels. Even more recently, the solid ties between DID and community-based development, emphasise a development that not only incorporates communities, but that happens within and through communities, that includes multiple stakeholders working together, and that works towards improving the socio-economic and cultural conditions of the community in disability inclusive ways.

This panel will bring together perspectives from various levels to share knowledge on how climate change can be a strategic avenue through which to discuss and promote such disability inclusive community development. A select panel of speakers will engage in active discussion to address key emerging themes and questions, including:

- How is climate change relevant to disability inclusive community development?
- Where are the intersecting points?
- What does a climate sensitive and responsive disability inclusive development entail?
- What is the role of persons with disabilities and their organisations in this process?
